As Spring slowly heads towards Summer, our Club is starting to Ramp up activities and fun!



PCC Scholarship News


From the Desk of David Atkinson

Greetings PCC'ers! In this episode, I'll talk to you about an unfortunate event that The Red Rocket and I suffered on our way home from the Surf to Springs Run 05Apr. While driving in heavy traffic in Riverside, I was struck in the left rear quarter panel by a hit-and-run driver. Thankfully, neither my passenger nor I were injured and the air bags did not deploy.

I signaled that I was pulling over to the curb as required by California Motor Vehicle law and as soon as I was stopped, the other driver sped away. My passenger was able to snap a photograph of the errant vehicle license plate as it sped away. Bummer. So while I awaited the arrival of CHP, I took stock of the damage.

It was far less than I had expected: I fully anticipated major damage due to the force of the impact and was pleasantly surprised at how little there was.

So other than a severely bruised ego, this is fixable.

The point of impact was the left rear wheel. There is a significant scrape along one edge of the rim and the tire shows evidence of the impact as the tire dressing at that location is gone. I intend to have the drivetrain inspected as the impact clearly was focused on the rear wheel.

LATEST CORVETTE INFORMATION FROM GENERAL MOTORS

Just announced at the Corvette Museum.

GM will build the new 1953T Corvette. Since Kindig Design has had unbelievable success with their Retro Version of the Original 1953 Corvette, General Motors realizes there is a desire from our Corvette Owning Family to own something special. So we contacted the folks who brought you the C5, C6 and C7, to have them develop the Retro 1953 T Corvette. Yes, the original design teams.

The details are still a little sketchy but here is what we know. It will be a limited production unit built in Bowling Green but not in the Corvette Plant (it may be built In St. Louis). Supposedly, from 5 feet away, you cannot tell the difference from the Original Polo White Version. The interior will have all the modern features of the C9 and More!! The Suspension and Brake system come from the C8 ZO6. The real exciting feature is the Power Plant and Transmission. For years General Motors has been working a better Turbine design. Being a member of a Corvette club for the last **20 years** I have tried to keep up with the new trends in the field. I got my first Corvette as a commuter car. I have always liked sports cars. My first one was an Austin Healy 100-6, an orange piece of crap but really cool. After Nancy and I got married we bought a '72 Datsun 240Z. This was a great car. Three years later with a mortgage and a new kid it was time to get out of a car with two seats and a monthly payment. Fast forward 25 years and after moving across the country, it was time for a new commuting car. I was heading toward an SS Camaro. I did some research and found out that Corvettes had become good commuting cars. As I was thinking about it I realized that what I really wanted was a Corvette. I couldn't afford a new Corvette and considering how I was going to use ita used one seemed to be the right choice. All this considered and the timing of my son moving out of the house it was time to start looking for a Corvette. There were a couple of restrictions, it had to be a six speed and Nancy said it couldn't be red or black. A few weeks later I found a car. It was a '95 competition yellow coupe with about 40k miles on it. It had about 140k miles when I sold it (as did the '03Z).

I have had several Corvettes over the years. The '95, a 2003Z, a '08Z, a '18Z, and all yellow. In the middle there was a '06 Monterey Red Coupe, Nancy's car. The first new Corvette we

bought was the '18z, we took museum delivery of a great car (took it 193 mph at the Mojave airport). All of the cars, except for Nancy's, spent significant time on the high speed road course at Willow Springs.

When the C8 Corvette came around it was time for me to keep up with the new models. It would be nice to get a new one, but having two perfectly good Corvettes made it somewhat impractical. The new yellow was quite bright. It was about the same color as my 240Z. There were not many yellows built. As the availability of cars started to expand during 2024 I found out something pretty interesting, there were very few yellows available. The dealership where I bought my '18, MacMulkin in New Hampshire, lists all the cars they have available. In later 2024 they listed over 350 cars immediately available. There were no yellow Corvettes. There is also a website, SOCALChevy.com that lists cars in the local area. No yellows there.

Around the beginning of December Nancy said "if you want one you can buy one. I took a deep breath and the next day I looked again. It was amazing; there were 14 yellow Corvettes available in Southern California. I started going through them to see what they were. I did not want a convertible, a Z06, or one that was heavily optioned. The car must also have the

front lift suspension and the Z51 package. **That** got the number down to 3.

Overall the car buying experience at Harbor Chevy was very good. I highly recommend them.


