REMEMBER.....THIS IS A RAIN OR SHINE EVENT.


Seriously, this is one of our most fun and scenic runs our club does. You don't want to miss this event. Usually the sun is out and



If you are a new Prospective member, the trip is worth two (2) Points toward your 12 point requirement to secure membership to our club.






NCCC President's Message October 2025

PCC Members



There was even a trophy for the best Corvette



LOOKING BACK


By the late '50s early '60s Hot Rodders, Surfers and Greasers were becoming a very big deal. Hot Rods became a dominating source of transportation. The



Youth Culture was taking Southern California by storm. It was a mobile rebellion that was very liberating for the teens. To many adults it appeared to be an intimidating movement. By 1962 there were some **45,000 car clubs** reported in the U.S. and an estimated **4 million hot rodders** (hooligans). This fledgling movement was gaining speed and many states started putting vehicle regulations into place. Some educators found the Hot Rod Culture diplorable and encouraged students not to own any type of car, especially if they valued their education. Sociologists and psychologists published reports stating that Hot Rodding masked deep psychological needs for attention, recognition and power.
