What My Corvette Has Taught Me

Weekenders and Occasionally Used Corvettes

Hey PCC'rs, this article is about my personal experience with my 2013 - 427 Convertible. Eleven months ago I replaced my battery. It was four (4) years old and new when I purchased the car in December 2017. Most of you know it is primarily a weekender with an occasional long weekend and week long trips to various places members conjure up for the club as well as personal trips.

I seldom used a battery tender over the four years I had the first battery. Occasionally I would hook it up a couple of days before a trip to make sure it was full of juice. That worked out fine for years. However, I had a lunch date with two of my buddies whom I've known for over 50 years. We were to drive our "Hot Rods" that day to show up one another. I would have won. Ed has a 2014 Aston Martin, Dennis a 2017 Porsche. Boring.

I jumped in to crank up "Johnny Red" andnothing! A click and odd sound. I figured it was the starter or the battery or the brakes or something. I called the "Boys" to reschedule lunch. I broke out my trusty multimeter to check battery voltage. Rats! 12.1 volts resting. I know anything below 12.6 resting volts (I've researched) is no bueno. I call AAA for their battery replacement deal and within 30 minutes or so I'm rockin a new battery. Guess what? It didn't help. It did finally start. Starter didn't sound all that good. That ruled out the brakes.

I called my trusty mechanic, Chris Johnson (the LS Dr.). I remember him telling me last oil change he recommended a new starter. The old one was showing signs of location is right next to the exhaust header and CAT. In the mean time I read the voltage on the "new"

Not all electric vehicles are Teslas!

The Sunswift II was designed and built by volunteer students at the University of New South Wales Solar Racing Team. Sunswift II was the team's second car initially built in 1987 and rebuilt and refined over the following seven years before its retirement, after being rolled off its trailer. Some damage can still be seen on the vehicle.

The power collected out of the solar array was around 12kW which is the amount of power it takes to toast a piece of bread, however, despite this the car had a top speed of 130 kph, or 80.7783 mph. This was possible through its efficient electrical system, excellent aerodynamics and light weight structure made of carbon fiber. The car competed in the 1999, 2000, 2002 and 2003 SunRace, the 1999, 2001 and





2003 World Solar Challenge from Darwin to Adelaid Australia. This is a distance or 2,618 kilometers or 1,626 miles. It's most notable achievement is its solar array for which it received the 2002 SunRace Enterprise Award for Technical Innovation.

Twenty-six students relinquished their summer break in 2000-2001 to manufacture 7,000 high efficiency Buried Contact Solar cells at 19.5% efficiency. The entire project was completed in under four months and involved approximately 10,000 work hours. The SunSwift team remains the only solar car team in the world to have constructed its own cells. In addition it also developed a new method of encapsulation that



allowed the team to construct solar panels with composite curves - another world first that enabled the elegant curves still present in the car. Over time some of this encapsulation has now delaminated from the cells

The race still occurs with an average winning speed in 2016 of 91.75 kmh. or 57.01087 mph. this is a far cry from SunSwift II's 53.2 kph. or 33.05695 mph. This car has been kindly loaned to the National Motor Museum of Bathurst, Australia at Mount Panorama Raceway by UNSW.

1958 XP-700 Corvette

One of many styling experiments by GM styling Chief Bill Mitchell, the XP-700 was built on a standard 1958 283/230 Corvette chassis. Styling cues included wire wheels, side exhaust, side gills, air scoops and an extended snout. After going though a couple of iterations, it is believed that the XP-700 was cannibalized to build the XP-755 "Mako Shark" concept car.
